Session Overview:

The CWAG Africa Alliance Partnership (AAP) recognizes Pfizer Executive Vice President and General Counsel Douglas M. Lankler with the 2019 Rule of Law Leadership Award, for his visionary guidance in growing the AAP's groundbreaking work on the African continent. Panel Overview:

Pfizer General Counsel Lankler will discuss the health risks, both pros and cons, of allowing the direct importation of foreign drugs into the U.S. Legislation is pending in 22 states to legalize the practice, bypassing the FDA approval process. Is history repeating itself a good thing? Fifteen years ago, a few states enacted such legislation permitting consumers to import such drugs and/or setting up state buying programs to buy "cheaper" drugs from Canada and elsewhere.

The Home Depot's General Counsel Teresa Wynn Roseborough will discuss the alarming increase in organized retail crime across the country that is endangering customers, employees and law enforcement, and funding the opioid epidemic. These are not petty shoplifters. She will discuss the need for and examples of a comprehensive approach to the problem that requires the cooperation of state legislatures, attorneys general, local police departments, prosecutors, retailers and resellers."

Microsoft General Counsel Brad Smith will address facial recognition technology and emerging social and legal issues such as risk of bias in the use of this technology; intrusion upon privacy and the use by government which may encroach on individual freedoms.

An update to the California ARL law requires e-commerce sellers, doing business in California, to allow online cancellation of auto-renewing memberships or recurring purchases that were initiated and to provide notify consumers who have accepted an automatic offer that includes a free gift, trial, or promotional pricing to cancel the auto-renewal before they are charged. Panel Overview:

In the aftermath of DOJ's release of its updated opinion on the application of the Wire Act of 1961 (18 U.S.C. §1084) in January, states and the gaming industry are continuing to weigh its potential impact. Reversing the government's 2011 position, the recent opinion re-interprets the Wire Act's prohibitions to apply to any form of gambling that satisfies the statute's interstate commerce requirements—not just online sports betting. This decision effects industrywide systems and practices founded on long-held understandings and precedent limiting the statute's application to sports wagering. Additionally, this decision potentially imperils state-operated lotteries, along with online gaming, intrastate gambling, and brick-and-mortar casinos. It may also reach interstate lottery games such as Powerball: on the face of DOJ opinion, many purely intrastate state lotteries and interactive gaming devices (progressive slot games, etc.) located throughout the country that use the Internet to transmit data in support of their operations could suddenly be deemed illegal by DOJ. This panel will explore the impact of this opinion on States and industries and the future of gaming and fantasy sports.

Under the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017, corporations are expressly allowed to deduct restitution payments which were or may be paid as part of a final judgment or settlement with a government or governmental entity. The new law has broad applicability to consumer protection, antitrust, securities, environment law, and other areas of the law that are regulated by the government. It requires that restitution or money paid to come into compliance with the law be specifically identified as such in the court order or settlement agreement, and the burden is on the taxpayer to prove that the deduction applies. Reimbursement of costs of investigation or litigation are not deductible. The law also imposes reporting requirements upon government regulators, beginning in 2019.

EPA (Invited)

Panel Overview:

Section 401 of the Clean Water Act requires applicants for a federal permit or license to provide a certification from a state in which a project is located that any discharges from the project into "waters of the United States" will comply with all applicable water quality standards, limitations, and restrictions, and "any other appropriate requirement of State law". Federal agencies are required to include conditions contained in a 401 certification in any permit or license. Disputes over the states' exercise of their 401 authority led President Trump to direct EPA to revise its existing 401 guidance. EPA announced it will issue revised guidance by June 10th. The panel will discuss the implications of EPA's revised guidance on state 401 certifications.

When Congress enacted the Clean Air Act in 1970 it established a framework in which the federal government and the states are to cooperate in the protection of health, environment and natural resources. This Cooperative Federalism framework was carried forward into the Clean Water Act and numerous other environmental laws adopted throughout the 1970s. Despite the Congressional directive to federal agencies to cooperate with states in the implementation of the environmental laws, changes in federal administrations has resulted in innumerable shifts in agency policy regarding the role of states in enforcement of federal environmental laws. This panel will explore the existing state/federal relationship, obstacles and opportunities for cooperative relationships between federal, state and private partners in environmental enforcement, and suggest ways to improve communication in those relationships.
